



DEPARTMENT OF CIVIL ENGINEERING

About the Department

The Department of Civil engineering was started as the third department in the institute with an intake of 60 students in the year 1971. Structural Engineering is first Post Graduate program started in the year 1984 of the institute with an intake of 10 students. The UG program has been accredited by NBA for four times and recently it was accredited for the years 2017-2020. After obtaining the autonomous status in the year 2007, the department focused towards providing state of the art curriculum development, offering electives of the present day need and techno innovative projects. These initiatives resulted in enhanced performance of the students in terms of increase in placement, increase in the number of students writing competitive examinations and pursuing higher education in the foreign universities.

Further Department of Civil Engineering was recognized as a research centre in the year 1994 leading to PhD/MSc in Civil Engineering under Bangalore University till 1998 and later it was brought under State Technological University VTU. The research centre has attracted 30 PhD research scholars to pursue their degree from this research centre and 15 research scholars have completed PhD degree. The areas of research include Structural Engineering, Transportation Engineering, Geo-Technical Engineering, Water resources Engineering and Environmental Engineering.

The Department has close interaction with number of industries and Government agencies through R&D, and consultancy works. It also has MOU's with industries and other institutes for improved interactions and coordination with outside world.

DEPARTMENT OF MECHANICAL ENGINEERING

About the Department

The Department of Mechanical Engineering commenced in the year 1962 with an intake of 60 students. The department has grown strong over the last 57 years with the intake rising to 180 students educated by a teaching staff comprising 53 members. The department was awarded the autonomous status by the VTU in the year 2007. Master's degree program in Manufacturing Science and Engineering and Computer Integrated Manufacturing were introduced in the year 1985 and in 2004 respectively to create adequate opportunities to scholars with a desire to pursue career in research and education. The Department also offers research program which includes MSc Engineering by research and PhD degree from VTU and at present 44 researchers are pursuing PhD.

All the staff members have post graduate degrees and 29 of the staff members are having doctorates. The staff members of the Mechanical Engineering department have taken up a number of research projects funded by many external agencies like DRDO, DST, AICTE, and VTU and have received funding to the tune of more than Rs. 1 Crore. Faculty members from the department have published books in different domains of Mechanical Engineering and these books are recommended by the

Visvesvaraya Technological University's Board of Studies as reference and text books. The department has also contributed in developing intellectual property for the institute by obtaining a patent and currently is in pursuit of three patents.



DEPARTMENT OF COMPUTER SCIENCE AND ENGINEERING

About the Department

The Department of Computer Science and Engineering (CSE) was established in the year 1984 to meet the needs of the emerging IT industry and research. The department started with an initial intake of 60 students in UG programme, CSE and enhanced its intake to 120 in the year 1994. The department has well qualified, experienced and dedicated teaching and nonteaching staff. Three of the faculty members are awarded their Doctoral in this academic year and many other faculty are pursuing their doctoral studies. In the year 1998, the department started M.Tech in Computer Science and Engineering and in 2014 the department started M.Tech in Computer Network and Engineering. The curriculum for both UG and PG at the department of CSE provides both breadth and depth across the range of engineering and Computer Science topics with industry standards. The department conducts vocational courses and proficiency courses during summer term on the various subjects pertaining to Computer Science, both for our students and students of other colleges in the state. In March 2019, apart from the regular curriculum, the department has started the PG Diploma, Big Data & Analytics and AI in association with IBM. This program is conducted both by the IBM and faculty of the CSE department and it is open for our students, staff, students from other colleges and working professionals. The department has state of the art laboratories like SAP, IBM Centre of Excellence and CUDA learning center. The department being accredited by National Board of Accreditation (NBA) since 2010. The department has MoUs with leading IT Industries like NVIDIA, SAP, IBM and HP. The CSE department also hosts several activities such as Project Exhibition, ACE Tech Fest and Alumni Meet. The department also organizes Conferences and Seminars. Eminent industry and academic experts participate as resource persons. The department of CSE has 100% placement track record every year. 





ENGINEERING CHALLENGES LOOKING TO FUTURE SPACE EXPLORATION AND TRAVEL

Presentation by Maj. Gen. Charles Frank Bolden, Jr., Ex-Administrator, NASA in association with M S Ramaiah Institute of Technology on 7 March 2019

Maj. Gen. Charles Frank Bolden, Jr., (USMC-Ret.) was nominated by President Barack Obama and con-firmed by the U.S. Senate as the 12th Administrator of the National Aeronautics and Space Administra-tion. He began his duties as head of the agency on July 17, 2009. As Administrator, Bolden led a nation-wide NASA team to advance the missions and goals of the U.S. space program. Bolden earned a Master of Science degree in systems management from the University of Southern California in 1977.

In 1978, he was assigned to the Naval Test Pilot School at Patuxent River, Md., and completed his training in 1979. While working at the Naval Air Test Center's Systems Engineering and Strike Aircraft Test Directorates, he tested a variety of ground attack aircraft until his selection as an astronaut candidate in 1980. Bolden's 34-year career with the Marine Corps also included 14 years as a member of NASA's Astronaut Office. After joining the office in 1980, he traveled to orbit four times aboard the space shuttle between 1986 and 1994, commanding two of the missions and piloting two others. His flights included deploy-ment of the Hubble Space Telescope and the first joint U.S.-Russian shuttle mission, which featured a cosmonaut as a member of his crew. Mai. Gen. Charles Frank Bolden. Jr. retired from NASA on Jan. 20, 2017.

On 7 March 2019 Maj. Gen. Charles Frank Bolden, Jr. delivered a presentation on "Engineering Chal-lenges looking to future Space Exploration and Travel" at M S Ramaiah Institute of Technology from 1.00 PM to 3 PM.

He addressed the students of Ramiah institutions and also hold interactions with stu-dents of RVCE, BMSCE, BNMIT, NMAMIT and PES University through Direct Video Conferencing.



Foam Concrete (Lightweight Cellular Concrete)

Foam Concrete

When a special foam is added to cement mortar, it produces a lightweight concrete termed as foam concrete. The lightweight of this concrete is due to air entrapped within the voids. Air bubbles created in this paste of cement is influenced by the type of foaming agent used. The foaming agent used in foam concrete is diluted with water to make a pre-foaming solution which is then forced at high pressure through the foaming lance. This produces a uniform, stable foam which has a volume greater than that of the prefoaming solution. Cellular concrete ensures sustainable construction and is the need of the time. Recently, research works are done on using recycled glass powder in foam concrete.

Applications

Foamed concrete can be produced with dry densities of 400 to 1600 kg/m³, with 7-day strengths of approximately 1 to 10 N/mm² respectively. Foam concrete is fire resistant, and its thermal and acoustical insulation properties make it ideal for a wide range of purposes, from insulating floors and roofs, to void filling. It is also particularly useful for trench reinstatement.

A few of the applications of foam concrete are:

- 1. Bridge approaches / embankments
- 2. Pipeline Abandonment / annular fill
- Trench backfill
- 4. Precast blocks
- 5. Precast wall elements / panels
- 6. Cast-in-situ / cast-in-place walls
- 7. Insulating compensation laying
- 8. Insulation floor screeds
- 9. Insulation roof screeds
- 10. Sunken portion filling
- 11. Trench reinstatement
- 12. Sub-base in highways

- 13. Filling of hollow block
- 14. Prefabricated insulation boards.

Advantages of Foam Concrete

By varying the amount of sand, cement, fly ash, water and foam used to make lightweight concrete, one can change its properties for every job or application. Below are a few advantages of using foam concrete instead of the conventional dense concrete.

- 1. As it is light in weight, so it has low density and high flowability. Buildings made of precast cellular concrete blocks have a reduced dead weight allowing to construct a lighter frame.
- 2. This concrete offers great resistance to fire, hence is incombustible. This helps in ensuring a better quality of life for everyone.
- 3. As foam concrete has a cellular structure, so it absorbs less water compared to the normal concrete.
- 4. Differential settlement has always been a threat to buildings, but by using this concrete in construction can aid in dealing with this threat as it is less susceptible to differential settlement.
- 5. Structures constructed of lightweight cellular concrete produces a monolithic, well-bonded structure that does not inflict lateral loads on adjacent structures.
- 6. To increase the strength of soils on which structures are built, the soil is compacted. If a structure is built from foam concrete then it offers about 100% compacted foundation. Thus, compaction is not required.
- 7. This concrete saves time and money both.
- 8. It offers sound absorption and more strength.

Disadvantages of Foam Concrete

No doubt there are a lot of benefits of using this concrete, but to everything, there is a darker side as well. The foaming agent can be dangerous to human health as well. A special expensive anchorage is required in the case of cellular concrete. This concrete offers more fragility.

The Dark Secret at The Heart of Al

Last year, a strange self-driving car was released onto the quiet roads of Monmouth County, New Jersey and it showed the rising power of artificial intelligence. The car didn't follow a single instruction provided by an engineer or programmer. Instead, it relied entirely on an algorithm that had taught itself to drive by watching a human do it.

The mysterious mind of this vehicle points to a looming issue with artificial intelligence. As the technology advances, we might soon cross some threshold beyond which using Al requires a leap of faith.

Artificial intelligence hasn't always been this way. From the outset, there were two schools of thought regarding how understandable, or explainable, Al ought to be. Many thought it made the most sense to build machines that reasoned according to rules and logic, making their inner workings transparent to anyone who cared to examine some code. Others felt that intelligence would more easily emerge if machines took inspiration from biology, and learned by observing and experiencing. This meant turning computer programming on its head. Instead of a programmer writing the commands to solve a problem, the program generates its own algorithm based on example data and a desired output. The machine-learning techniques that would later evolve into today's most powerful AI systems followed the latter path: the machine essentially programs itself.

The workings of any machine-learning technology are inherently more opaque, even to computer scientists, than a hand-coded system. This is not to say that all future Al techniques will be equally unknowable. But by its nature, deep learning is a particularly dark black box. We need more than a glimpse of Al's thinking, however, and there is no easy solution. It is the interplay of calculations inside a deep neural network that is crucial to higher-level pattern recognition and complex decision-making, but those calculations are a quagmire of mathematical functions and variables.

Machines that truly understand language would be incredibly useful. But we don't know how to build them. Just as many aspects of human behavior are impossible to explain in detail, perhaps it won't be possible for AI to explain everything it does. If that's so, then at some stage we may have to simply trust AI's judgment or do without using it. Likewise, that judgment will have to incorporate social intelligence. Just as society is built upon a contract of expected behavior, we will need to design AI systems to respect and fit with our social norms. If we are to create

robot tanks and other killing machines, it is important that their decision-making be consistent with our ethical judgments.

Exploring our Planetary Neighborhood

There is no place more inhospitable and mysterious than space. This is one of the reasons that it inspires such passion and dedication amongst astronomers, as in spite of our many years of stargazing and spaceflight, we still know very little about the universe in which we live. Great progress has been made in the hunt for planets that lie outside of our solar system. Known as extrasolar planets or exoplanets, analysis of their atmospheres and possible surface conditions allows scientists to postulate on one of the most poignant and scientifically frustrating questions known: Are we alone?

This question has occupied the scientific community since the early nineties. There have been many other forays in search of new planets. The launch of MOST, the Microvariability and Oscillations of Stars project, in 2003 was followed by three subsequent missions in 2005, 2006 and 2009, all supported by the invaluable Hubble Space Telescope. Planet-searching equipment known as HARPS has played a key role from the ground. This blur of acronyms has led to an impressively high success rate; currently, the tally stands at over 680 planets discovered, orbiting over 470 stars — a remarkable achievement in just under 20 years.

The discovery of new exoplanets inevitably leads to questions concerning how many of these worlds could be home to life —

intelligent or otherwise. One recent study tackled exactly this, directly comparing both exoplanets and planets within our own solar system to planet Earth. The 'Habitability' index considered factors such as atmosphere, magnetic field, available sunlight, surface organic compounds and tides. Another index, 'Earth Similarity', dealt with density, distance from parent star and size.

There are a vast range of bodies considered to be habitable, and this raises new questions. For example, who says life should be carbonbased? Is oxygen necessary? Does the planet need a Moon for life to evolve? Does the planet need a solid core? These culminate in a single question: does a planet need to be similar to Earth to sustain life? This question remains unanswered, but as shown by the study above, the answer may lie within our own solar system. Most people have heard of the past history of water on Mars, and recent NASA research has uncovered evidence for liquid water on Jupiter's icy moon Europa. Titan, as previously mentioned, is very Earth-like in many respects, and has not yet been fully explored. The progress achieved by missions such as NASA's PlanetQuest is promising. However, as the search progresses, it becomes apparent just how much there is left to explore in our solar system, galaxy and universe — and just how alien our stellar neighborhood is to us.

Elevated Corridor Project In Bangalore and Its Impacts

Anyone who lives in Bangalore is keenly aware of the high levels of traffic congestion here. People are forced to spend hours stuck in traffic jams. According to a study in 2017 Bangalore had the slowest moving traffic in India. One solution to this is 'grade separated' junctions where bridges and underpasses are built to enable vehicles to keep moving in their desired directions, without having to cross oncoming project. Taken a step further the essence of the 'elevated corridors' project proposed by the government.

The elevated corridor Project covers a distance of 102 kms. It is estimated to cost between 25000 crores to 26000 crores including land acquisition cost and is expected to be in place by 2025-2026. The Public Works Department will implement it through the Karnataka Road Development Corporation Limited. The work is expected to begin by this year.

Impacts:

Environmental impact assessment report says project needs 56.89 hectares of land. The proposed elevated corridor, which will criss cross the city through 102km, will affect as many as 1131 properties and require a total of 56.89 hectares of land. The report states that properties include 209 residential, 577 commercial and 32 religious structures. The KRDCL will be spending 11555 crore to acquire the properties. As per the reports 56.89 ha of land needed for the project, 17.76 ha is owned by private parties. Apart from these 33.52 ha of land owned by the state government, 2.54 ha of defense land, and 3.07 ha of land owned by the Union Government. For the implementation of this project approximately 3700 trees should be removed, which includes more than 120 trees in Cubbon park.

I found a bizarre situation when thinking of this group of friends; they were regularly critiqued by teachers and faculty and labelled the "underperforming;"

My thoughtful friends were kept as a kernel in my brain. What may be labelled as cynicism would interrogate every thoughtless action I took. It questioned every step that was taken only for my own gain. It forced me, to consider what I was doing. I tried ignoring this nagging part of my brain until I finally came to university. I arrived at the University with a nice scholarship and experience in academics. Registering for a first-year student seminar, as is required, I chose that which sounded most interesting: a course on the decline of civilizations. I thought of lectures on the decline of Rome and Edward Gibbon, or the end of the modern era in 1945

or even a look into how our own society will fall. However, when I entered class on the first day, I was met with surprise by the professor's introduction.

When introduced to this topic, I found myself at a loss for any way to respond. How was I to consider something that I had done without thought? I silently listened to students' talk of their experiences. Now, only one student's response remains in my mind. I recall someone saying that he had given himself two choices: either earning his MBA or taking a year-long break to ski. Clearly he chose the former, but, though I made the same decision I hadn't even given myself two options.

It was university or my life was over. I moved through the first few weeks of this course with some anxiety. Finding an answer to this question began to overwhelm me. I could either apply thought to creating a response for our first assignment or do as had always done. Of course, humans are creatures of habit. This is to say, I chose not to apply much thought to the essay.

I think, now, of what I could have written. In hindsight, I could have said that I was simply appeasing the ambitions of my father, who was desperate for me not to follow the traditional family line as a tool salesman. I could have spoken of the pressure that is placed on high school students, who are often told that the only way to make anything of oneself in the world is to attend a four-year college and find some lucrative career.

Maybe I would have written about all the paths that are laid not by an individual's ambitions but the ambitions that they have been given. Sometimes I think I may have

even said that I chose to attend university because I wasn't thinking: at least it would have been honest.

I can't say that an average grade affected me very much, but I was affected by an odd feeling of dissatisfaction. I couldn't say where this discontent was coming from at the time and I was certainly deficient in any ability for self-analysis. Through the rest of my first semester I tried to force the realization that college was not for me. I thought often about quitting.

My solution came suddenly during a conversation with my academic advisor. He asked me, "What interests you?" It seems a likely question, but I had never considered it before. I had been overwhelmed by what I assumed were the ambitions of others when I should have placed my interests first. This question immediately changed my attitude by forcing me to consider what it was that I wanted to study. The ability to think critically came from studying subjects that made me want to think. When I stopped imposing outside influences on myself, I broke my automatization and found a place at university for myself.

ENGLAND

Having won 10 of its past 12 bilateral series, England is the world's best one-day international team and has the ICC ranking of number one to prove it. Since the last world cup they have crossed 300 runs, 34 times which is 14 times more than the second best team India. Their strength is that they have explosive deep order batsmen's like Jos Buttler, Jonny Bairstrow and Ben Stokes

who can hit from the first ball. They also have a balanced bowling attack. Their opportunity is that they are playing on their home ground. Their threat is that they have not won the world cup so far.

Natural Calamities in India

Natural calamities are occurrences that take place as natural disturbances, resulting in widespread destruction of lives and properties. Thousands of people in India are killed every year due to natural calamities such as floods, earthquakes, heavy rains, cloud bursts, lightning and other natural disasters. Later, thousands of people die from diseases caused by natural disasters. Despite widespread destruction caused by these occurrences, the country does not have an effective disaster management system in place. Earthquakes, landslides, droughts, floods, tsunamis and cyclones are major examples of natural calamities.

Types of Disasters and their spread in India

Earthquake is caused by the increase in internal pressure between the tectonic plates - huge rock pieces within the earth's crust which causes them to break apart. In addition to simple and mild earthquakes, severe earthquakes have occurred in different parts of the country such as Uttarkashi (1991) and Latur (1993). Draught is caused by the fall of lower volumes of rain. North-western part of the country is highly drought-prone region. Floods come due to more rain in a short time, low pressure areas and low exit-flow. India is the second highly affected country where floods are common in the rainy season. Typhoons occur due to earthquake (tsunami) in the oceans. Cyclones come due to temperature and pressure variations in the ocean. In the Bay of Bengal and the Arabian Sea, 5 to 6 tropical cyclones take place every year.

Growing Awareness

There is increasing consciousness across the world about the environment in the wake of natural calamities, but it is not making any difference on the actual ground. Only lip service is being paid to environmental protection. There is a mounting concern on environmental imbalance in India too and its impact on the individual, society and the life of the nation. But the efforts to reduce the environmental imbalance are proving to be inadequate.

Over-exploitation of natural resources has led to environmental imbalance which also contributes to increasing instance of natural disasters. There is undue exploitation of water resources due to increasing urbanization and industrialization. It has led to contamination of water and decrease in ground water levels. The gaming industry has brought about a meteoric rise in the demand for faster GPU's. GPU manufacturers like AMD and NVIDIA are constantly in a race against time to develop hardware capable of supporting ever more demanding games, with stunning photorealistic imagery that a few decades ago would've been thought to be processable on nothing less than a supercomputer.

But bringing such powerful hardware into the hands of consumers comes with one major quandary - the cost factor. GPU's are incredibly expensive to manufacture, and hence not cheap to purchase. The gaming industry, constantly moving forward with leaps in technology, has a key difference from other fields - the cost of hardware, even dated ones, doesn't drop significantly with the ingress of newer technology. So, the crux here is this, why should people pour a significant amount into purchasing a GPU if it isn't a future proof investment? NVIDIA has tried to come up a solution to help futureproof your investment into their latest line of GPU's using Deep Learning and AI.

About DLSS

NVIDIA's Deep Learning Super Sampling aims to tackle the issue of making cheaper GPU's capable of processing 4K imagery. Processing 4K images is no easy task, since there are 4 times the number of pixels to process than in a 1080p frame, which means a 4x more load on the GPU. This results in GPU's putting out significantly lower frame rates in 4K as compared to 1080p. NVIDIA's solution to this is resolution upscaling, the process of taking a lower resolution image, say in 1080p and scale it up to 4K while preserving image quality.

How it works

DLSS employs deep learning using a neural network to upscale images from lower resolutions to higher resolutions with an output quality comparable to the actual high-resolution image. Taking a sample of 4 pixels of a 1080p image and upscaling to 4K, we get something like this.



NVIDIA's DLSS technology trains a neural network with 1080p images as the input. The network generates an upscaled 4K image, which it now compares to the actual 4K version of that image and learns from it. Over several iterations, the network trains itself to fill in the '?' pixels, learning from it's predicted outputs by comparing it with the actual image to improve accuracy. A newly designed game is submitted to NVIDIA during development. NVIDIA produces 1080p images and 4K images of the same scenes, along with other resolutions. NVIDIA's AI compares the two and trains the neural network with a given architecture, that performs the upscaling part of the DLSS feature. The weights information for the neural network is sent over driver updates, along with metadata that describes the network architecture. Then at runtime, the Tensor cores of the GPU simply use that network to perform the inference pass for any given frame, to produce the upscaled one. In simpler words, your GPU can now run a game at 4K like quality with little to no effect on performance as compared to 1080p. This is monumental in bringing modern photorealistic image quality to low and mid-range hardware, and is a good step forward into letting people experience high quality visuals without having to purchase a more powerful GPU. Here we see how potent the DLSS technology is in the game Battlefield 5 by EA.

We compare performance at actual 1440p resolution, and 1440p upscaled from a lower resolution by DLSS on NVIDIA's RTX line of GPU's





A difference of 42.5% in performance in terms of frames per second being processed by the GPU while having an unnoticeable difference in quality, which is astounding! Scope for further development is through super sampling instead of upscaling, where a 1080p image would be upscaled by a neural network to 8K resolution and then downscaled to 4K, giving a sharper, more

crisp output than normal upscaling. Overall, this is a good initiative in bringing top end features to budget hardware, all made possible through machine learning and Al. Being able to experience top end features on budget GPU's means we don't have to worry about our existing hardware being outdated any time soon!

Unraveling time travel: A deeper insight

The reality of Time Travel

The verdict is in, and has been for a while now: time travel is indeed possible... but limited to hypothetical considerations. Remaining consistent with Einstein's theory of general relativity, there are a number of theoretical ways that travelling backwards through time might be achieved. However, none of these seem to have practical applications that would allow for a functional time machine to be built.

Enter the paradoxes

It would not be false to say that time travel has seen plenty of contenders over the years. Namely, these come in the form of paradoxes that seem to contradict it.

The Grandfather Paradox

It involves a contradiction being presented in the form of a person, going back in

time (either voluntarily or involuntarily), and assassinating (intentionally unintentionally) their grandfather. Hence, if their grandfather died, then there was no one to give birth to the person's parents, and finally the person itself. So if the person was never born, then who went back in time and assassinated the grandfather? The example outlined above is the most popular iteration of the paradox, although it is applied more broadly to virtually any conceivable set of conditions where the past is altered by a prospective time traveler, and hence the future is changed. Resolutions to this however, are purely speculative, including, the traveler being unable to affect their own future, due to them going back to an alternate reality in a multiverse hence altering that reality's future rather than their own.

The Bootstrap Paradox

Consider, for instance, the following scenario: let's say a professor of quantum physics gains access to a time machine, and he travels forward in time to a future date where he reads a mathematical equation from a textbook .He returns to the past, and discusses what he read with one of his students, who becomes inspired by the idea, and decides to work out the equation for himself. After a bit of labor, he manages to produce a working variation of the mathematical equation his professor described seeing, and then publishes a book about it... which becomes the very book that the professor read about during his visit to the future. The idea seems simple enough thus far... so where is the paradox? Here the problem arises: conceptually, the idea for the newly discovered equation didn't come from the professor, nor did it come from the student as each of them learned about it second hand from the other, as a result of the professor's journey into the future. Yet, it came to exist nonetheless. In other words, the equation is part of a self causal loop, and is actively causing its own existence. However, where did the idea originate from? Who originally developed it?

Resolution?

For physicists, these paradoxes are indeed disturbing, because it contradicts the orderly nature of things expressed by the known laws of thermodynamics. Herein we find a close relationship between entropy and information in our universe, and thus, the idea that information could simply appear "from nowhere" is equivalent to breaking thermodynamic laws. Since this is impossible according to what we know about the laws that govern our physical universe, we might ask, does this also disprove the notion of time travel as being viable at all? As it has already been expressed, time travel (at least backward in time) is a hypothetical possibility and could be achieved in a variety of ways that are in agreement with general relativity. However, if it were ever to become a reality, and information could indeed be passed from one state to an earlier one in history, the outcome may be indeed be very strange and unforeseen. We may find ourselves asking questions like," did anything in the past really happen, the way it's been said to have happened?"

Hey, I'm Vikas from 3rd year ISE. I have been to more than 10 hackathons hosted by companies like Amazon, Google, Visteon, etc. In this article, I would like to shed some light on what hackathons are, benefits of participating in hackathons and finally how to win hackathons.

What is a hackathon?

Hackathon is a coding competition which involves students as well as software developers mostly for 24 to 48 hours wherein participants are required to build a prototype and present it to judges for a given problem statement. For instance "Women Safety" was the problem statement at the Hackathon by Visteon. Some hackathons are "Open Innovation" meaning there is no restriction on the domain or problem statement. Some online hackathons last for 2-3 months involving rounds such as quiz, ideation, implementation, presentation, etc. This was the structure in Amazon AWS Educate Challenge.

Why participate in a hackathon?

- 1. Lots to Learn It helps us to learn to work under pressure in a limited time frame which is the case once we start working. In other words, it prepares us for the Corporate work culture. Also, hackathons help us to improve team management and communication skills.
- 2. Platform to showcase Talent Hackathons are really good opportunities to showcase our coding skills, as it happened in my case. I wasn't that interested in academics but was very skilled in programming. Thus, for me, hackathons were like outlets to exhibit my skills.
- **3. Internships and Jobs** Some companies use hackathons for talent acquisition. I got my first internship through a hackathon by Visteon.

- **4. Prizes** Most hackathons offer cash prizes for winning teams. Prizes could range from 1,000 rs up to 10,00,000 rs. 10,000rs was the prize amount in CODEFURY by Visteon while it was 1,00,000rs in Smart India Hackathon. Sometimes goodies as offered as complementary prizes.
- **5. Networking** It is the best place to connect with people. It could be someone who is interested in the same domain as you are or an employee of the organizing company. Networking plays an important role in getting funds for projects and also while applying for jobs and internships.
- **6. Swags** Last but not least, goodies such as T-shirts, water bottles, bags are given in most hackathons. **How to win a hackathon?**
- 1. Equal importance for Planning and Presentation Given the limited time frame most of us dive directly into the development of neglecting planning and presentation. Planning is wherein we come up with innovative ideas to stand out among the crowd while Presentation is where we make the judges understand our work. Innovative ideas can win hackathons. In CODEFURY by Visteon, "Women safety" was the problem statement and everyone started to develop the app with the given requirements. But our team came up with an Alexa skill which stole the show and helped us to win the hackathon.
- 2. Holding on to nerves During the hackathons there will be a lot of ups and downs. Sometimes everything will start crashing as it happened in CODEFURY for my team. At one point in time, we thought of walking out of the venue to avoid embarrassment. That would have been a great mistake as we went on to win that hackathon. And also if the first round doesn't go well we should not give up and continue to work. So it is very important to keep calm and to continue working and develop never give up attitude.

3. Use trending technologies One thing I have observed in my hackathon journey is in most cases winning teams would have incorporated technologies such as Machine Learning, Deep Learning, Blockchain, etc. This gives extra points to those teams. Additional brownie points can be obtained by incorporating products of the organizing company, for example, API's.

Conclusion

- 1. It's more than winning the hackathons After starting with hattrick hackathons victories I met with a disastrous 4 losses. I was disappointed and embarrassed to the core as I took these hackathons personally. So it is very important to understand that at the end of the day it's just a hackathon, win or lose we should take it easy and realize there is always another hackathon coming up.! Does Sachin always score a century? Does India always win? Just like this, we may not win all the time and it is very important to develop a competitive spirit.
- 2. Don't carry forward the Bad coding habits Given the limited time frame during the hackathon it's fine to write least secure and least maintainable code. But these are very much discouraged in companies which I realized only after my internship at Visteon. So it's very much important to ensure we don't inculcate these habits in day to day coding.

How Architecture Revived A Dying City - The Bilbao Effect

A dying city plagued by terrorism and failing industry. One building built on the grounds of impossible ambition and a spark of hope. Finally, an outcome that grew larger than life. This is the astonishing story of Bilbao, Spain and how one ambitious building turned around an entire city's economy.

For years, Bilbao was scarred by the Basque separatist terrorism. Trade and industries were failing or were moving away. The now world-famous museum Guggenheim was their solution to act as "a driver of economic renewal" and "agent of economic development". It was meant to be a tool of mass attraction and a catalyst to their failing industries. Ambitious as it was, starchitect Frank Gehry made this dream into reality.



The Guggenheim Museum Bilbao, on the banks of river Nervion is a museum of modern and contemporary art designed by Canadian-American architect Frank Gehry So, what exactly was the agenda? How does one revive a city with just a building? As herculean a task as it sounds, the plan of action was fairly simple in principleturn Bilbao from the industrial port hub it was, to a tourism led service economy, the Guggenheim being its instigator.

Bilbao was an industrial port city that centred on shipping, manufacturing and commercial trade. But, owing to deindustrialization, Bilbao started losing industry. At this point was when the city's council made an executive decision to transform the city into a tourist magnet. And the Guggenheim did just that. Once opened, the city's economy exploded. It became a mandatory item on everyone's bucket-list of places to visit. Visitors spent large amounts of money on accommodation, shopping, transportation, eating, drinking and other commercial activities. This opened up new avenues for business and created jobs. The footfall was so unbelievably enormous that it could revive and restart the economy of an entire city.

Tourists were pouring in to witness the amazing spectacle the Guggenheim is. For, Gehry had revolutionised the way buildings could be designed. His new take on modernism and insistence on breaking its fetters of stylistic tropes is what caught the attention of the masses. Steering away from any sort of accurate categorisation, Gehry's audacious design was refreshingly new and effortlessly captivated anyone who set their eyes on it.

Sitting on the banks of the Nervion river, this mega project is described as "a fantastic dream ship of undulating form in a cloak of titanium, its brilliantly reflective panel also reminiscent of fish scales." Enormous sheets of titanium along with stone and glass seamlessly blend into the background context which further solidifies its concept and makes it a marvel. Architecture

that blends in with its context without ostentatiously standing out, yet capturing everyone's attention is truly appreciable and a goal most architects aim to achieve.

Gehry's radical ideas of deconstructivism shown in this building drew the attention of thousands. It was this bold step that propelled Gehry to worldwide fame and recognition along with the Guggenheim becoming a symbol of modern architecture etched in our minds forever. The success and impact of the museum was so overwhelmingly huge that the term "the Bilbao effect" was coined.

The Bilbao effect, also known as the Guggenheim effect simply put, is "a phenomenon whereby cultural investment plus showy architecture propels the economic upliftment of cities, down on their luck." But, Gehry says Guggenheim's popularity, though intended at being impactful enough to turn around an economy, took him by surprise. Having an annual footfall of an astounding one million visitors, Gehry's design, to this day, is passionately discussed by the public. This insane idea of transformative effects of art was reinforced by the massive success of Guggenheim. For, architecture is not just stone and concrete buildings. Architecture is a feeling that a space exudes; its aura precedes its aesthetic beauty. It is the happy marriage of functionality and aesthetics. Architecture can also be interpreted in the way it visually, culturally, socially and economically affects its environs. It is the owner's signature as well as a mark of respect. When a building turns into the face of the city, impacting its economic growth due to its popularity, is where the unimaginable magnitude of architectural power comes in. Guggenheim, Bilbao harnesses all these qualities, leading to the Bilbao effect. The Bilbao effect proves that architecture could be ambitious, aesthetic and popular all at once. The Guggenheim's eye-catching demeanour and annual footfall are testimony to this.

Though past examples such as Sydney with its Opera House and Paris with the Pompidou Centre do exist, what set Bilbao apart is the economic gap between its before and after. As the craze to recreate the Bilbao effect still continues, this building remains as a pioneer of an ambitious project, massive economic growth, and art as a social and economic growth catalyst. The Guggenheim, Bilbao will forever be remembered as an icon in architecture.

Deep Medicine

How Artificial Intelligence (AI) can make healthcare human again?

Medicine has become inhuman, to disastrous effect. The doctor patient relationship – the heart of medicine is broken. Doctors are too distracted and overwhelmed to truly connect with their patients, but medical errors and misdiagnoses are increasing. In Deep Medicine, leading physician Eric Topol reveals how artificial intelligence can help. Al

is hyped as the fourth industrial revolution, but others decrying it as the greatest threat to modern society and many call for AI as less artificial and more intelligent. Al has the potential to transform everything doctors do, from note taking and medical scans to diagnosis and treatment, greatly cutting down the cost of medicine and reducing human mortality. By freeing physicians from the tasks that interfere with human connection, AI will create space for the real healing that takes place between a doctor who can listen and a patient who needs to be heard. Innovative, provocative, and hopeful, Deep Medicine shows us how the awesome power of AI can make medicine better, for all the humans involved.

Deep Medicine summarizes hype and threat, and then takes us to a place where no one else has gone, a future in which AI helps to reestablish empathy and trust between doctors and patients. The task is formidable because Al, which has transformed how we seek information, how we shop, how we connect to each other, has had comparatively little impact on health care. The effects thus far - electronic medical records, data collection for billing and the development of high-tech procedures such as robotic surgery — seem to have made health care decidedly less human. Can Al reverse this trend and heal the doctor - patient relationship? Or will it make worse the problems of technology, but with devices that replace more humans and destroy privacy?

Deep Medicine will facilitate the concept "Patient Will See You Now". It also looks at how the use of AI is changing medicine in a challenging and enlightening treatise. Central to this discussion is the conviction that the practice of medicine is in need of a paradigm shift toward doctors being better equipped to understand and empathize with their patients. AI underscores its effectiveness in pattern reading, the major

task of pathologists, radiologists, and dermatologists, as well as less developed uses in mental health and surgical fields. Al also has potential effects on health provider systems, apps that monitor patient biometrics, and collection of health data. This also provides with an impassioned plea for doctors to use the time freed up by Al advances to get to know their patients better as people, and not just medical problems or questions. This is the ultimate future of medicine.

Deep Medicine builds on what algorithms do best: pattern recognition. It takes advantage of how AI is being applied in radiology to read X-ray films, in pathology to identify tumour cells and in dermatology to diagnose skin lesions. It can also provide a similar approach in ophthalmology, where algorithms can detect diabetic retinopathy, and in cardiology, where AI is beginning to uncover cardiac arrhythmias such as atrial fibrillation by tracking data from wrist-based sensors. More unusual is Al's deployment in mental health care, through robots that can read mood from shifts in voice and facial expressions. These inevitable algorithms can integrate data from online behaviour (such as patterns of typing or scrolling), sensors, the medical literature and clinical records. Al will inherit the tasks best done by machines. leaving doctors' time to do what they do best - providing compassion and being present for patients.

The first act in the play is by technology giants like Google, Baidu, Alibaba, Apple, Amazon, IBM and Microsoft, along with hundreds of health-tech start-ups in the United States and Europe and more than 130 medical Al companies in China. The evident problem is that the health care has become a massively expensive enterprise that no longer serves the needs of doctors and patients. In wealthy countries, the costs continue to grow without commensurate improvements in outcomes. In poorer regions, the lack of

health-care workers becomes unsustainable as the population and its needs expand. The setting for this play is through a sea of data from online behavior, sensors, smartphones, genome scans, imaging, lab tests and clinical records. Deep Medicine is about technology and health care, but it evolves surprisingly towards the values of the past while imagining the tools of the future. Describing how medicine has changed since training four decades ago, one feels that technology has not improved things. By bringing together the deep phenotyping of digitized medicine, the engagement of the empowered patient and the analytical power of AI improve the doctor-patient relationship. This is the 'Empathy robot' Reeti, made in France for use in health care.

Digital medicine, defined as the use of digital tools to upgrade the practice of medicine to one that is high definition and individualized, holds promise in revolutionizing healthcare and well-being. This new digital age of medicine has the potential to democratize access to care and empower patients to engage with their health in a truly preventive way. It also holds the promise of helping clinicians to navigate the increasing volume and complexity of patients' data in a cost-efficient and time-saving manner. Al and deep learning, is among the leading technological tools beginning to be used in the interpretation of medical images and electronic health records. These tools are speeding up diagnoses, guiding therapeutic choices and optimizing patient experience. The US Food and Drug Administration (FDA) have granted approval to an AI based device to detect certain diabetes-related eye problems. It was the agency's first market approval of a medical device that performs a screening test and provides a referral to a specialist without the need for a clinician to interpret the image or results. It also uses cost-effective strategies and big data to accelerate the regulatory path of clinical trials, and medical product development. The Pre-Certification Pilot Program, one of the outcomes of this FDA initiative, enabled Apple to quickly receive clearance for use of its electrocardiography app (a feature of the new Apple watch), which provides overthe-counter information for identification of certain cardiac arrhythmias in users of the high-tech watch.

Although the benefits of this digital revolution are easy to point out - such as improvements in accuracy, productivity, workflows and access - the magnitude of the challenges it creates is harder to predict. Over-the-counter use of medical devices to detect conditions that normally would require assessment by a physician could lead to over diagnosis in the healthy population, increasing the burden handled by health care systems instead of relieving it. Other challenges in digital medicine include ensuring the privacy of health data and establishing proper consent and patient governance in data collection, and developing regulation to protect individuals against the use of personal data for discrimination. Finally, it is worth exploring how the human aspect of medicine - the bond between patient and physician may be affected by the increasing use of technology in medical practice.

President Trump signed an executive order making the development and regulation of Al a federal priority. Doctors are using Al to spot potentially lethal lesions on mammograms. Scientists are also developing Al systems that can diagnose common childhood

conditions, predict whether a person will develop Alzheimer's disease and monitor people with conditions like multiple sclerosis and Parkinson's disease. AliveCor, with their Mayo Clinic collaboration, developed deep learning algorithms to determine a person's blood potassium levels via a smart watch ECG signal. Google AI and its Deep Mind division has worked on accurately triaging urgent eye conditions, predicting outcomes in the hospital setting, and prospective study of pathology slides in cancer. There are emerging data to support personalized nutrition, such as avoiding glucose spikes after eating, which are highly individualized, much more common than anticipated, and related to the specific foods we take in and our gut microbiomes. Al can also help the precision of delicate microsurgery, as seen with the retina. There will be better robots for surgery than we have now. But that will not obviate the need for human surgeons as it will just augment their performance. Nobody will like the surgery to be done by a robot.

Al can also detect depression by scanning a person's Instagram photos. For the first time, objective metrics for state of mind and mood like tone of speech, breathing pattern, smartphone keystrokes and communication, and physical activity is obtained in real time. It is well known that people would rather share their innermost secrets with an avatar compared with a human being. So, the landscape is ripe for Al to help alleviate the profound shortage of health professionals compared with the enormous burden of depression and other mental health conditions.

Al has the potential to markedly improve productivity, efficiency, work flow, accuracy and speed, both for doctors and for patients, giving more charge and control to consumers through algorithmic support of their data. Some key areas include pattern recognition to promote the rapid and accurate reading of

medical scans, slides, skin lesions, pickup of small polyps during colonoscopy. Another is keyboard liberation, or using natural language processing of speech to synthesize notes and eliminate the ultimate source of distraction and dislike in medical encounters. Some of the liabilities include breaches of privacy and security, hacking, the lack of explainability of most AI algorithms, the potential to worsen inequities, the embedded bias and ethical quandaries. Finally "One thing for sure: 20 years from now (and hopefully sooner) we won't be saying "deep learning in medicine", "precision medicine", "clinical decision support", "personalized medicine", "digital medicine" and "genomic medicine" - it'll just be "medicine" - Dr. Eric Topol (June 27, 2015) "I predict that within 10 years no medical imaging study will be reviewed by a radiologist until it has been pre-analyzed by a machine" RSNA President Dr. Nick Bryan (May 1, 2016)

Glowworm Swarm Optimization

The Glowworm Swarm Optimization (GSO) algorithm was introduced and developed by Krishnanand and Ghose in the year 2005. The GSO algorithm is most widely used nature inspired techniques to capture multiple peaks. The phenomenon of emission of light from living organisms is called as bioluminescence. This algorithm is based on the bioluminescence capability of

glowworms and the ability to change their brightness level during the attraction of prey or to communicate with other glowworms. Glowworms emit light using a chemical substance called Luciferin. From the GSO algorithm, we understood that the agents (i.e. glowworms) glows at intensities proportional to the function value being optimized. The glowworm with lesser intensity is assumed to move towards the brighter ones. The GSO algorithm differs with other nature inspired techniques in that it integrates a dynamic decision range by which glowworm has the ability to ignore the glowworms which are out of its vicinity range. The GSO algorithm is mainly used for simultaneously capturing the multiple local optima for a given multi modal function. The GSO algorithm is more efficient in finding the multiple local maxima or minima when compared to other nature inspired techniques. The GSO algorithm is divided into two phases - a) the update and selection phase, and b) the movement phase.

a) Update and Selection phase: The luciferin content of the glowworm is selected to reflect the function value of each agent at its current position. At each iteration, the leader of the agents having the least function value (i.e. higher luminescence) is selected using,

$$l_{i+1} = \underset{l}{\operatorname{arg \, min}} \ f(l_i) \quad 1 \le i \le I_{\max}$$

Where Ii is the best fitness value of the solution i which is proportional to the luciferin quantity in the position i, n is the number of agents and Imax is the maximum number of iterations.

b) Movement phase: Each agent decides to move towards the leader that has a luciferin value more than its own. From the selected leader, calculate the average distance to all other agents. All the other agents move towards the leader agent with a step size 's' and the updated position is obtained using,

$$x_{i}(t+1) = x_{i}(t) + s * \left(\frac{(x_{j}(t) - x_{i}(t))}{\|x_{j}(t) - x_{i}(t)\|}\right)$$

where, xi (t) is the location of the ith agent, j is the leader agent and s is the step size, which indicates the distance moved by the agent. The quantity (xj(t) - xi(t)) gives the direction of movement. ||.|| is the Euclidean norm operator, thus (xj(t) - xi(t)) e direction of movement.
